ENCOURAGING GROWTH

After a long drought, a Colorado peach farmer looked over his dying orchard, shook his head and said, "There is nothing quite as demoralizing as seeing our trees. when there was so much potential, dying. There will be no growth or fruit this year." I have to agree. What a waste.

Farmers are not the only ones who experience the heartache of loss. I have comforted Sunday School teachers, pastors, and parents who have seen their friends, neighbors, and family members turn from a new and growing faith in Christ to rejection of the church. In the shock of such loss, the question often arises, "What could we have done differently?"

While we cannot make another's faith secure, there are some time-proven practices for helping those who come to Christ grow up in Christ. Let's look at three – prayer, presence, and encouragement.



Be constant in prayer. Praying for someone you are discipling not only helps them; it also helps you. In times of prayer, God opens your eyes to needs and opportunities you may not otherwise see. Make prayer foundational to your life.

Be consistent in presence. One of the greatest promises Jesus made to His disciples is found in Matthew 28:20: "I am with you always." While we cannot make the same promise, we can intentionally and regularly "check in" with those we are discipling. Our regular involvement in their lives will give us opportunity to listen to their concerns and provide Godly council and guidance.

Be abundant in encouragement. Change, even positive change, is stressful. Do not pass up an opportunity to help your disciple see present struggles in the light of ultimate victory. Remember, God inhabits the praises of his people (Ps. 22:3). Be a person of praise.

It was the great evangelist Billy Graham who said to Christian disciplers, "Decision is five percent; following up the decision is the 95 percent." How are you doing with the 95 percent?

This issue of *Connection* is about spiritual growth. The question is how you, as a ministry leader, can help those who have started out well in the faith grow and mature in it. This issue will point to a number of resources that will help you do just that. Let's keep growing!

Unplugged? by Rev. John Comstock Who has time to meditate in a digital age which has increased the

velocity of information racing toward us? Our smartphones tell us when we have a new text, tease us to look at our Facebook newsfeed, chirp at us when we have a new email, and scream at us when someone actually does the unthinkable by calling us to talk. Information is flowing at speeds we have never experienced before in history. This makes it difficult for us to focus and pay attention. In fact, many experts in the field of neuroscience would suggest technology is re-wiring the way we process, think, pay attention, and remember.

Put simply, meditation is a matter of focused attention. In other words, meditation is "paying attention to what you are paying attention to." Have you ever gone through your morning routine only to stop and ask yourself, "Did I brush my teeth?" When we habitually go through the motions of getting ready, we may find we aren't really "paying attention to what we are paying attention to." Growing "like a tree planted by streams of water" because we are "meditating" on Scripture requires focused attention. The question is, how do we help people do this?

This is what the goTandem custom mobile app does. This mobile app identifies key areas of struggle and then systematically sends daily, short verses of Scripture with reflection questions. Best of all, it allows users to reflect by taking notes about the Scripture in the app.

This mobile app enters into the busy spaces, where people actually are, to help them redirect thoughts and "pay attention" to Scripture. On the information superhighway, we need signs along the way to make sure we are going in the right direction. Without these three principles, we have nothing to offer that is different from any other women's organization. The major purpose and goal of Women's Ministries is to disciple women. We do this by sharing life experiences, learning together, and understanding who we are in Christ.

Together we experience growth as we share how we discover peace in the midst of the storm. We continue living when the pain is so deep we only survive by leaning on the everlasting arms. We learn biblical truth as we test and try God's promises to discover their truths. We find strength in knowing God has plans to give us a future and hope. We grow by trusting God's faithfulness.

Want to Grow in Bible Knowledge? by Dr. Woodie J. Stevens

Think about the first thing that comes

to mind when someone says, "To grow spiritually you must memorize many Bible verses!" Many people respond, "But I can't memorize. I have tried it, but I can't."

What if there is a simple way to easily learn hundreds of Bible verses and quote them accurately? Thousands have discovered an easy method of learning and telling Bible stories in such a way they can literally quote hundreds of Bible verses. They know the Bible, not from memory, but from the heart. The technique is "Tell THE Story," an oral-learning methodology.

My office received this report. "When I was invited to attend 'Tell THE Story' training, I wasn't really sure what to expect. What interested me was the orality factor; I was thinking about my home state and its rural areas where the illiteracy rate is high. Little did I know that 'Tell THE Story' is for every person, regardless of age, social status, or level of education. When I found out how to learn the Bible stories and ask guestions, I experienced the living Word of God going deep into my heart; this caused a revival in my spiritual life. 'Tell THE Story' has changed my life and the way I learn and share the scriptures. This simple method is a tool empowering people to share the Word of God with still others."

Another person wrote, "We practice 'Tell THE Story' every week with our youth! It is thrilling to see how everyone becomes so engaged in discovering truth that they want more!"

In "Tell THE Story" training, participants learn simple Bible stories to share with others. They can hardly wait to go home and tell their families a Bible story and ask simple discovery questions. Others love to go home and read the story more closely, finding additional treasures from God's Word. Young disciples like "Tell THE Story" for this simple reason: If I tell them the truth, it is my truth. But if I help them discover truth for themselves, it becomes their truth.

When the Storms of Life Rage... by Wm. Marshall Duke



Life was challenging for Thomas Obadiah Chisolm. His health was so fragile that there were periods of time when he was confined to bed, unable to work. After coming to Christ at age 27, Thomas began to find great comfort in prayer, in scriptures, and in the fact that God was faithful to be his strength in times of illness.

Lamentations 3:22-23 was one of Chisolm's favorite scriptures: "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness" (KJV). In 1923, Chisolm used these words as the basis for Great Is Thy Faithfulness, a hymn that has brought hope to thousands.

Like Chisolm, many others have found comfort and consolation through prayer and scripture during seasons of their lives when things seemed to be at their worst.

Rev. Jim Page settled on Philippians 4:13 as his life-verse: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." The world of this young pastor and father was turned upside down in 1979 when his wife, Norma, was brutally murdered in the Nazarene church parsonage. The case went unsolved until 2010 when the assailant confessed; however, he went unpunished due to mental and physical health issues. Jim's "rock" was Paul's Philippians passage.

Wayne and Sharon Shands, school teachers, devoted 18 summers ministering in churches at VBS events. At age 54, Wayne began exhibiting pre-Alzheimer's issues, necessitating early retirement by age 57. Sharon bravely tried to manage his circumstances, but she finally had to turn to specialized care, where he remained until his death. Through this season, Sharon was encouraged by the number of Christian friends who were lifting her up in prayer (Exodus 17:11). Encouragement also came through lyrics like, "He gives me peace in the midst of my storm," reminding her that she shouldn't worry about anything (Philippians 4:6-7).

Lamentations 3:28-31 underscores God's faithfulness and outlines steps we should take when in peril: "When life is heavy and hard to take, go off by yourself. Enter the silence. Bow in prayer. Don't ask questions: wait for hope to appear. Don't run from trouble. Take it full-face. The 'worst' is never the worst. Why? Because the Master won't ever walk out and fail to return" (The Message).

Clearly, when the storms of life rage, we can be sure that He will faithfully stand by us.

Who Needs the Whole Body? by Tim Truesdale

"The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you." I Corinthians 12:21



If you are reading this article, you are probably a leader in the church—and have been for a while. And that means you have some history with being a disciple of Jesus. As you look back on your spiritual growth, you could probably see the most progress during seasons when you were surrounded by a company of other like-minded believers. In fact, if you are like me, your best growth as a follower may be as clear as the width of rings in a tree reflect favorable growing conditions like rainfall and sunlight on a year-to-year basis.

But we all know that there is always a present danger; the complacent disciple chooses to forego the relationships that will challenge his sense of ease. The world, the flesh, and the devil ALL present convincing excuses to let oneself become isolated. Maybe you have heard one or more of these temptations: "I will spend more personal time in the Word by eliminating travel time to fellowship. Or I have gained (lost) weight and don't have the right clothes to go to

church." Or how about this one: "I am in such a bad mood, there is no way I could possibly 'get anything out of' attending my accountability group (or prayer meeting)." Say it isn't so; none of you would ever harbor such immature thoughts such as these, which have sometimes popped into my head.

As is so frequently the case, discipleship lessons are just as often "caught" as "taught." As leaders, we are continually sending messages about our level of conviction that we need fellowship. Those who follow us would be well served by seeing our generous and consistent investment of time in relationships that challenge us to grow.

I very definitely believe that Paul spoke under inspiration of the Holy Spirit as he was penning I Corinthians 12, including verse 21. So if God's plan is for me to exhibit healthy growth in measure according to my connection to the body of believers He has surrounded me with, then it would certainly be worth my time to check my heart, with God's help, to confirm whether I am taking full advantage of every opportunity He is providing. Sounds like fellowship is not just a luxury, but a NEED!

The Book of James speaks about disciples who hear the Word but walk away and forget it as surely as someone who looks at their reflection in a mirror and then does nothing about what they see. That's not us. We are men of action.

A Growing Sense of Mission: Curious, Committed, or Called? by Kenny Wade

Everyone is called to join the mission of God. But not everyone is called to be cross-cultural missionaries to the far reaches of the map. Acts 1:8 gives us these growing areas of missional influence beginning right where we live and extending to places we may go. The beauty of the call to be a disciple of Christ is that it begins right where we are today in our community, with our culture, and then beyond! That's what Mission Immersion 2016 is all about:





Mission Immersion invites 9-12th graders to participate in a mission training camp for those that are Curious, Committed, or Called. Some high school students may simply be curious about discerning ways to more effectively join the mission of God locally. Others may have already committed time and resources to doing just that but have ventured out in other service opportunities, like a mission trip. A few youth will know that at some level they have been called by God to join His mission in some expression of vocational living. This may range from tradiational modes of mission to unique expressions of practical and creative roles in the work-a-day world.

July 6-10 students will journey with mentors as they map their mission journey: where they have been, where the are going, and how Christ is shaping them for His mission. They will participate in daily activities to explore, be equipped, and be immersed in various expression of discipleship in Christ, Community, and Culture.

July 10-13 participants in 9-10th grade will practice joining mission in Indianapolis with a compassionate ministry center. The 11-12th graders will be transported by ROAM (RVs On A Mission) with mentors and staff to one of four Youth In Mission locations experiencing integenerational and cross-cultural mission contexts. These may include: St. Louis, Missouri; Detroit, Michigan; Toledo, Ohio; or Turkey Creek, Kentucky.

Mission Immersion is hosted by Youth In Mission in partnership with Global Mission, NYI, and Compassionate Ministries. Please share this opportunity with your local church students, including NYI and NMI leaders.
